HEALTHY HOUSING ADVOCACY NEEDED TODAY: HELP US WIN THE SENATE!

Thanks to your efforts [HB 346](#) passed the Senate Judiciary Committee late Wednesday by Committee Substitute. We are working hard to get the bill out of the Senate Rules Committee and it could be on the Senate floor for a vote as soon as Monday. We need your help to continue moving forward this year!

Please contact your Senator and urge them to VOTE YES on [HB 346](#). HB 346 would allow tenants in unhealthy and unsafe rental homes and apartments to complain to code enforcement and secure needed repairs without being evicted.

Talking Points:

HB 346 seeks to protect families living in rental homes facing mold, leaking roofs, rats, insect infestations, lead, radon, and unsafe electrical and other conditions when they exercise their right to seek repairs and complain to code enforcement. These conditions are forcing children and vulnerable adults into the emergency rooms and hospitals across the state in high numbers. Georgia is the only state in the country that does not protect tenants against unsafe and uninhabitable housing conditions with a “warranty of habitability.”

HB 346 would allow Georgia to join 41 other states (including FL, TN, TX, AL, NC, SC, MS VA, etc.) that prohibit landlords from retaliating against tenants with evictions merely for seeking repairs for unhealthy and unsafe housing.

Georgia has some of the highest eviction rates in the country. After eviction families have an even harder time finding a place to live, children are forced to change schools, and families are forced into less stable and less desirable housing.

The Bill that passed the House was carefully negotiated with the Georgia Apartment Association and Georgia Realtors Association to address their objections, while retaining the purposes of the Bill. Their objections have been addressed and they have withdrawn their opposition to the Bill. Now new opposition has arisen from the Georgia Affordable Housing Coalition and we have worked to meet their demands and move the bill while protecting its central purpose. **These groups are mobilized to protect their financial interests. We must meet their powerful influence with our advocacy and our voices.**
